Station 3 – Bat Vocabulary & Flap Chart

Glue the Bat vocabulary flap chart onto page 3. Glue the Bats Have, Can, Are flap chart onto page 4. Give a definition for each of the vocabulary terms. Write a sentence or two to complete the “Bats Have...” “Bats Are....” and “Bats Can...” Flap Charts. You may use a device or knowledge from the video or info graphic to help you.

Station 4 – Bat Life Cycle

Glue the Bat life cycle chart onto page five. Cut out the life cycle descriptions and glue them into the correct spaces.

Station 5 – Bat’s Body

Glue the bat body chart onto page 6 and the worksheet onto page 7. Study the Bat Body Chart and complete the worksheet to label the body parts.

Station 6 – Bats in the Bible

Trim and Glue the blank bat body onto page 8. Cut out 3 lined circles to fit over the bat body and glue them on to create flaps. For each circle of the bat’s body (there should be three) write a Bible verse that mentions bats... you may need to explain the story.

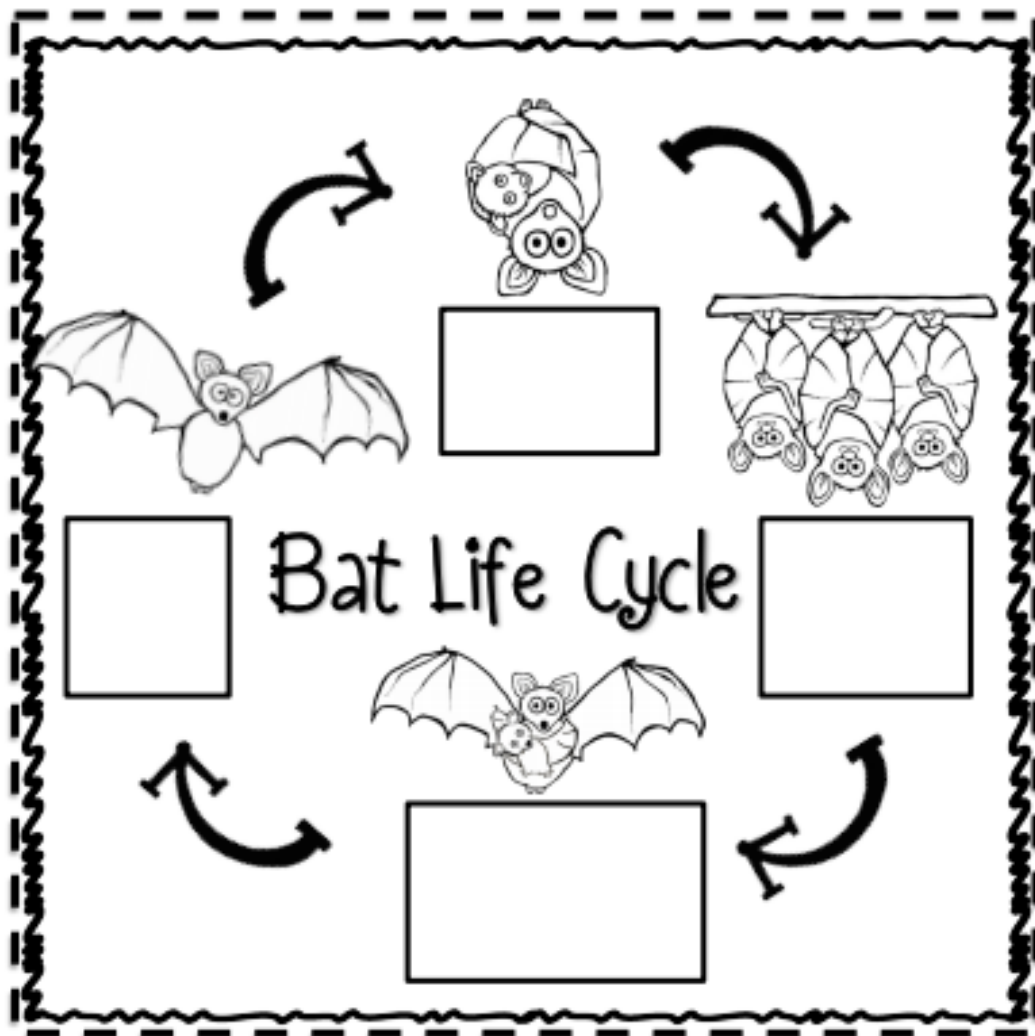

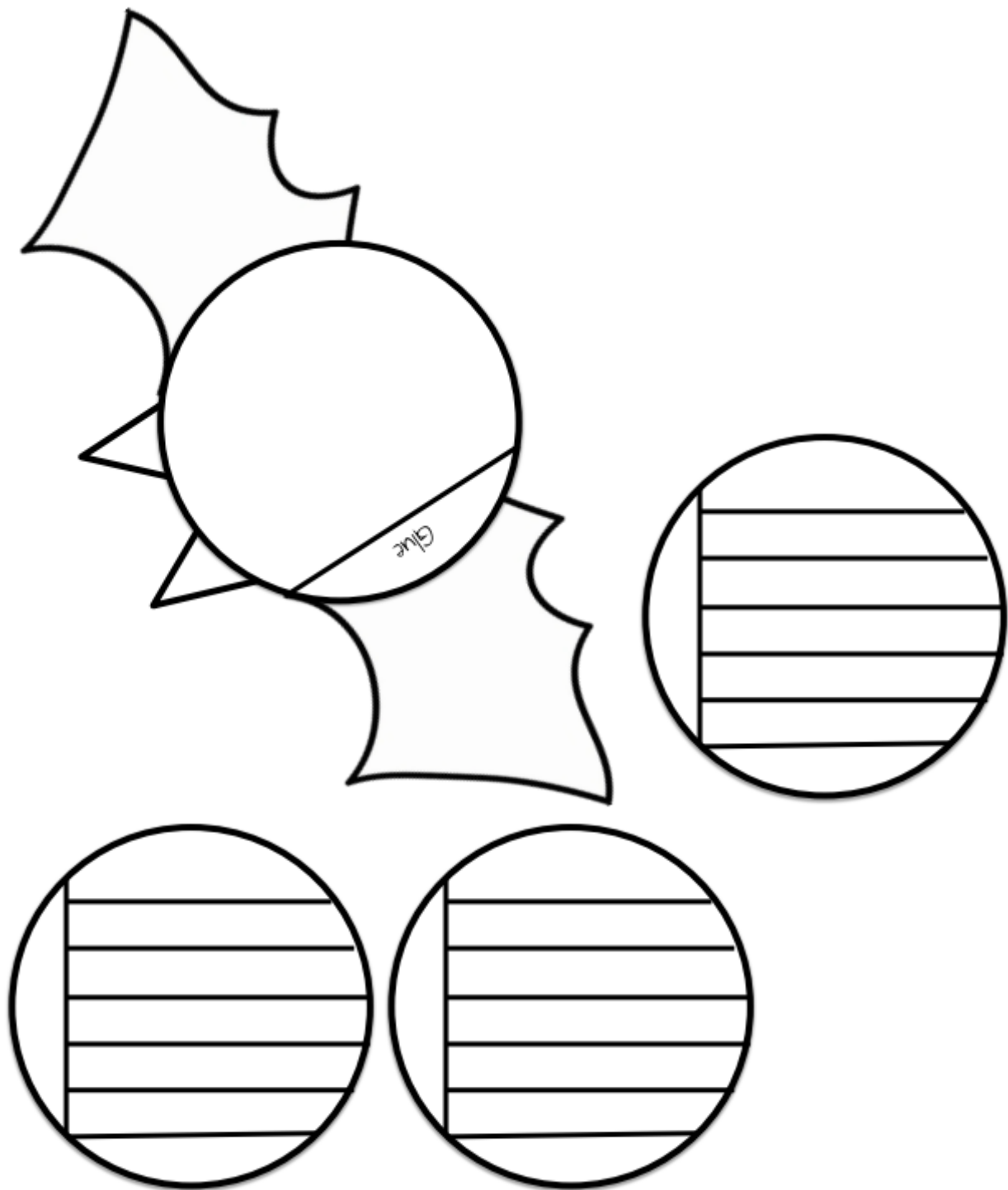


A bat is an adult when it is around one year old.

Pups spend time together in a nursery while their mothers are hunting.

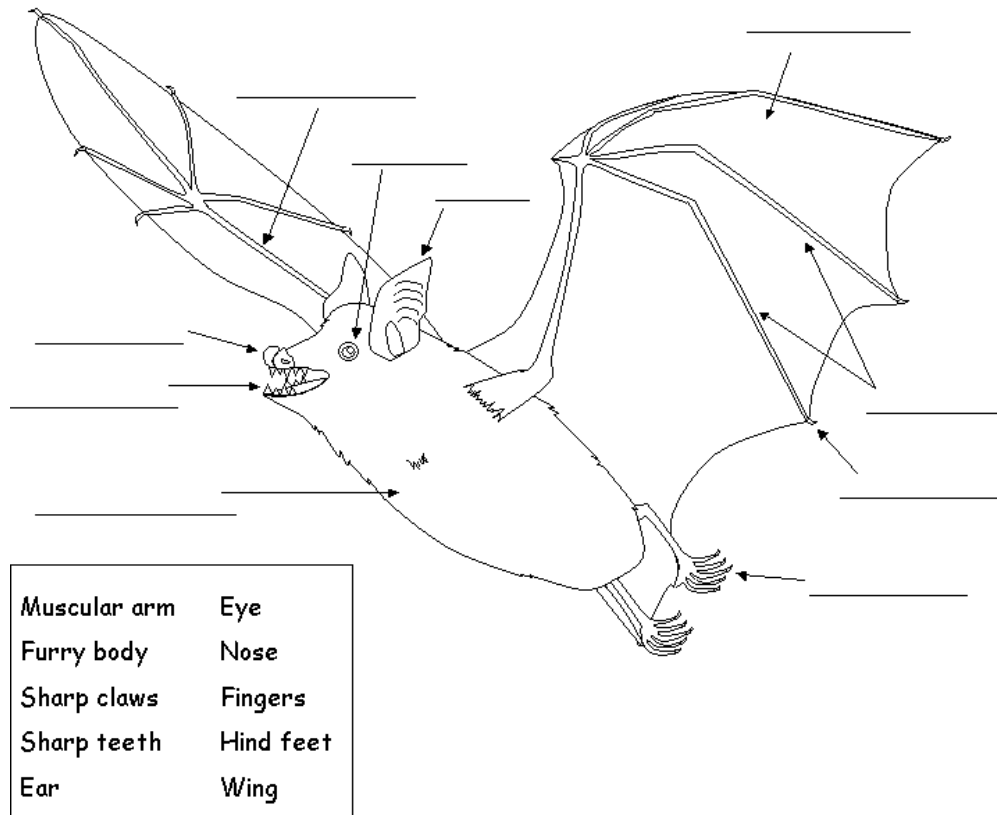
Pups cling to their mother while she flies to roost. The pup cannot fly on its own until it is 2-3 months old.

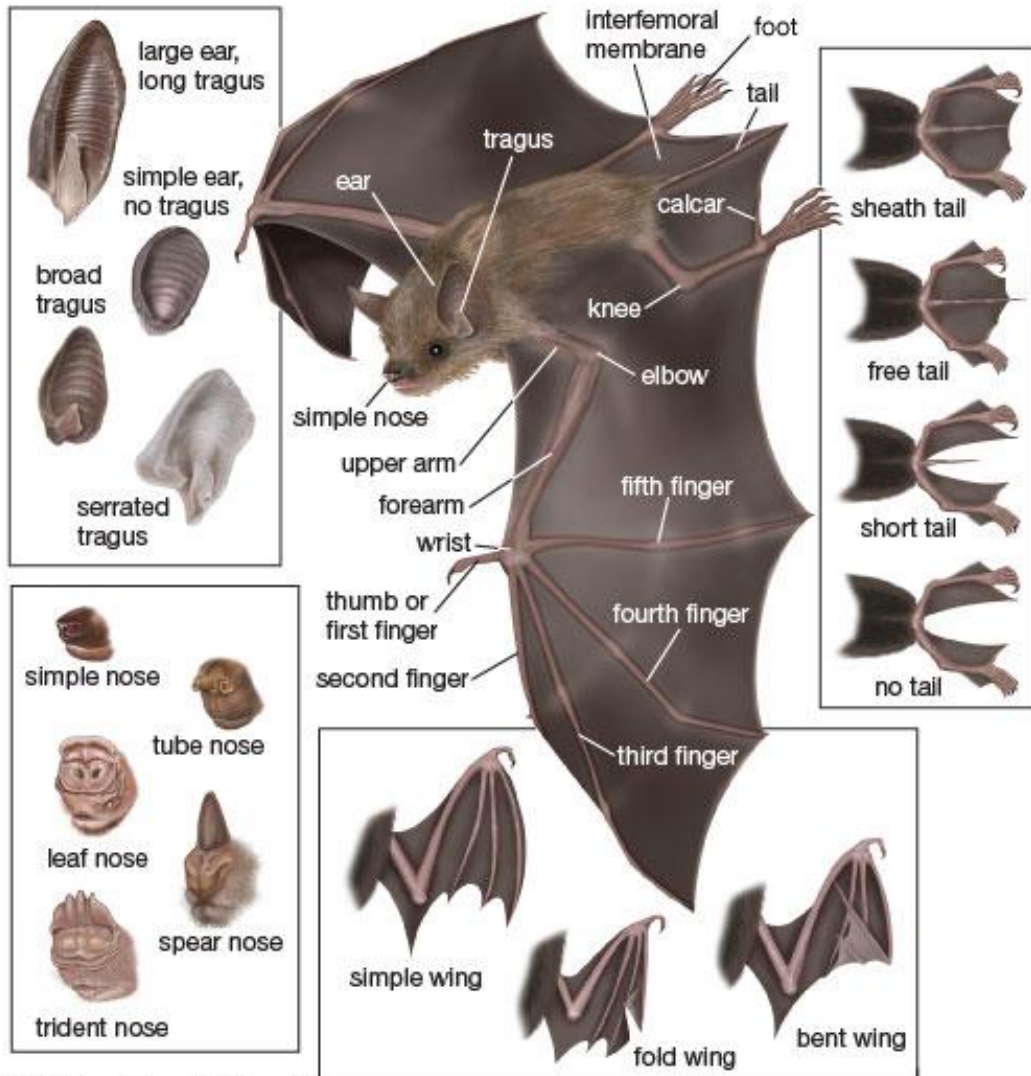


Little Brown Bat: This bat is Canada's most commonly seen bat. It weighs about around 8 g and it's wingspan is about 22 cm. The brown bat likes to make it's home in attics and barns and hibernates or migrates in the winter.

The Little Brown Bats diet consists mainly of insects. It can eat 100% of it's own body weight in insects every night! That is a lot of mosquitoes! The bat finds it's food using Echolocation.
